Letter from the Chair of Governors

Annwyl Rieni / Dear Parents,

It is my great pleasure to present this annual report from the Governing Body. 2022-23 was, once again, a highly successful year. Despite a challenging picture both locally and nationally, the governors worked with the staff in the school to manage the school finances extremely efficiently. Priority 3: to develop Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) across the school

In May 2023, we were visited by Estyn, the School inspectorate for schools in Wales. They look at all aspects of school life including teaching and learning and how the school is run, including the role of the Governors. We were all vey pleased with the outcome. There was only one recommendation which was to continue to develop the planning for Curriculum for Wales. The role of the Governing Body was described as 'outstanding'. We are very proud of this achievement and are pleased that Estyn recognise the excellent work of children, staff, parents and Governors in our close school community.

Governors and staff in the school appreciate all the support provided by parents in ensuring that students attend punctually every day and are prepared to learn. SCHOOL DEVELOPMENT PLAN 2022-23

A number of targets were set as part of the School Development Plan for the year 2022 - 2023 and have been evaluated as part of the Self Evaluation process. Here is a short evaluation of the targets

Priority 1: to improve pupils' standards in the application of Numeracy across our new curriculum

Ann Jones undertook a book scrutiny for Mathematics and Numeracy with Chair of Governors

MJ carried out an analysis of the WNN test (Procedural and Reasoning) data from Summer Term 2022 to inform pupil progress. This enabled staff to target individuals and groups who needed intervention or support

Ann Jones (Maths and Numeracy Independent Advisor) visited staff to discuss and plan numeracy activities for topics that are to be covered this year. This ensured that topics provide opportunities for the application of numeracy skills across the curriculum.

In the Juniors, learners complete a '5-a-day- maths activity. This provides learners the opportunity to practise procedural skills that have previously been taught and consolidate their skills.

In Early Years, parents were invited into school to attend a presentation on how Numicon and other concrete resources are used to aid the teaching of Mathematical Development. This was followed by the opportunity for parents to visit their child's classrooms to see Numicon and other concrete resources being used. As a result, parents have a better understanding of how they can support their child at home.

The school has continued with the Singapore approach to teaching Maths through Inspire Maths. This consolidates number skills and ensures a secure foundation for Mathematical Development.

MJ has attended Maths co-ordinators meetings with Ann Jones and other maths co-ordinators across Flintshire to receive updates on the new curriculum giving him the most up to date information on the new curriculum.

Juniors continue to use Times Tables Rock Stars to regularly practise multiplication.

Pupils have weekly opportunities to apply their numeracy skills in lessons outside.

In the Early Years outdoor area, a 'Literacy and Numeracy Shed' has been put into place. This means that numeracy resources are readily available for learners to use in the different areas of the outdoors.

Numeracy across the curriculum was monitored as part of the school's SPP allowing our partners to share good practice. Headteachers from two other schools carried out a learning walk to see how numeracy was applied across the curriculum.

Seesaw is being used to capture and evidence numeracy being applied indoors and outdoors. We held an Inspire Maths morning workshop. Parents, as a result, have a better understanding of how Inspire Maths works and more confidence to help their children with Maths homework at home. **Priority 2:** to develop a whole school approach to Health and Wellbeing as part of the new curriculum for Wales

Years 5 and 6 completed their Friends Resilience programme which equipped the children with ways to deal with friendship issues and how to become more resilient. Spectrum visited to talk about healthy and unhealthy relationships. A member of staff attended a course on Mental Health First Aid.

Weekly Wellbeing Wednesday sessions provide opportunities to explore the 5 ways to wellbeing:

- **Connect**: Strengthening relationships with others and feeling close to and valued by others, including at work, is critical to boosting wellbeing
- **Keep Learning**: Being curious and seeking out new experiences at work and in life more generally positively stimulates the brain.
- **Be Active**: Being physically active, including at work, improves physical health and can improve mood and wellbeing and decrease stress, depression and anxiety.
- **Give**: Carrying out acts of kindness, whether small or large, can increase happiness, life satisfaction and general sense of wellbeing.
- **Take Notice**: Paying more attention to the present moment, to thoughts and feelings and to the world around, boosts our wellbeing.

The Display in Llanarmon made by pupils suggests ways in which they can try the 5 Ways to Wellbeing

We held a TASC week based on Anti bullying which informs pupils of the different types of bullying. It also gives pupils ways in which we can all try to prevent bullying. PC Llinos informed pupils on how to stay safe online.

All pupils Year 2 – 6 completed the Pupils Attitudes towards Self and School assessments. We were then able to target any pupils who were having issues with their own self-esteem or their attitude towards school through intervention such as sessions with our ELSA or 'bubble' time.

The Juniors took part in a sponsored walk up Moel Famau to raise money for NEWSAR. This includes several of the 5 ways to wellbeing including 'Being active' and 'giving'.

There was also an emphasis placed on food and cooking through our Cooking Club which teaches to make tasty, nutritious meals using healthy ingredients. We grew our own food in the garden using a grant. Pupils also successfully took part in the CogUrdd competition which teaches pupils to make healthy meals. Years 5 and 6 pupils took part in 'Come and Cook' run by DCC which teaches pupils about diet and nutrition.

The School Council created a 'Relaxation Shed' using a grant to create a safe place for relax.

Priority 3: To ensure that effective assessment and tracking systems impact positively on the progress of all pupils

Taith 360 is used for planning and tracking which ensures coverage of the new curriculum. Termly Assessment weeks are held including Standardised tests and Welsh National Tests.

Data from tests is used to track pupil progress and highlights individuals who may need extra support or intervention.

Termly pupil progress meetings are held where individual pupils are discussed with class teachers, headteacher and ALNCo. This ensures that the child is always at the centre of our planning.

PASS (Pupils Attitude towards Self and School) is used to monitor pupils' wellbeing. Any pupils who need support are targeted for additional intervention and support. Feedback and marking policy has been reviewed following a book scrutiny (March 2023). This means that feedback is specific and leads to progress.

New individual pupil target sheets have been introduced.

Seesaw is used to collate evidence. Work is shared with parents through homework and the 'work I am proud of' folder. Pupils and parents, when appropriate, have a voice in how they learn through one page pupil profiles.

Priority 4: To raise the standards of Welsh, increasing pupils' engagement in learning and their everyday use of the language; igniting learners' curiosity and enthusiasm for a lifelong interest in the languages of Wales and the languages of the world.

The elected Criw Cymraeg take their role seriously. They set the agendas for each meeting and write the minutes to feedback to the rest of school during assembly.

Members of the Criw Cymraeg use Welsh phrases to welcome children into assembly

and display the 'Cymraeg yr Wythnos' around the school

All pupils learnt the Welsh poem for the School Eisteddfod and a number of pupils competed in the local Eisteddfod with 4 pupils successfully getting through to the next round.

The school Eisteddfod was organised and led by a group of children as part of TASC week. The children also shared their Welsh poetry and music with members of the community in an afternoon of Coffi a Chan'.

Special days have been celebrated in school such as Diwrnod Owain Glyndwr, Diwrnod Santes Dwynwen and Dydd Miwsig Cymru. This helps pupils to realise that Welsh is a living language.

Pupils have been learning about our Welsh history and heritage through 'Mewn Cymeriad' drama company.

Junior pupils learnt about the importance of local scholar John Davies as part of the 'Translators' project'. Pupils have learnt of his role in the translation of the Bible and the significant relationship with the school and the local church in Llanferres.

Pupils took part in an art/craft project based on 'Cynefin'. Staff use Welsh at every opportunity.Pupils have taught MDSAs how to play yard games e.g. Faint o'r gloch, Gorsafoedd Years 5 and 6 pupils have attended Cardiff with Ysgol Borthyn where they had the opportunity to experience Welsh history and culture.

Priority 5: to raise standards of the DCF/to develop coding skills as part of computational thinking across the curriculum (STEM approach, DARES approach)

The GwE audit of staff skills was completed which highlighted areas of staff development Staff used Barefoot Computing lessons to aid computational thinking and The DARES scheme of work was purchased and used as a teaching resources in

all year groups.

Design Apply Refine Evaluate Share

Digital leaders were chosen in both Junior classes and they take their role seriously. RD attended 2 day course STEM training 'Using mysteries to improve engagement and learning in primary science'. This was cascaded to all staff Coding activities e.g. Scratch week/Beebot activities, Tinkercad – 3d graphics programme used in Years 5 and 6

CURRICLUM ORGANISATION

Ysgol Bro Famau is a primary school for 3-11-year-old pupils. The 3-7 year old pupils are in the school's Foundation Phase, which is based in Llanferres. The pupils transfer to Key Stage 2 in the Llanarmon site when they are 7 years old. Here again Years 3& 4 pupils and Years 5 & 6 pupils work very closely. This means that detailed and constant planning occurs between the staff of all the teaching years.

Since September 2011, the implementation of the Foundation Phase is statutory for every child under 7 years of age in Wales. The Foundation Phase curriculum is based on Literacy, Numeracy, Knowledge and Understanding of the world, Physical development, Creative development and Personal, Social, Welfare and Diversity. Emphasis is placed on developing the pupils' skills by means of motivating experiences and activities based on various themes.

In Key Stage 2, all of the curriculum subjects – Welsh, English, Mathematics, Science, Information Technology, History, Geography, Design and Technology, Physical Education, Music and Religious Education are taught with the allocated times for each subject meeting the statutory requirements.

Since September 2013, the statutory Literacy and Numeracy Frameworks are integrated into the curricular activities.

7 and 11 year old pupils are assessed in the core subjects – Language, Literacy and Communication, Mathematical Development and Personal and Social skills for the Foundation Phase and in English, Mathematics and Science at the end of Key Stage 2. Since Summer 2013, Years 2 – 6 are assessed annually in reading and numeracy. These assessments are statutory for every school in Wales.

ADDITIONAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS AND PROVISION FOR SPECIFIC NEEDS

Every child's needs whatever they might be are catered for at this school. No discrimination is made on the basis of race, language, disability or ethnic and/or social background. Every child has the same opportunity to develop his/her full potential. The school has an accessibility plan for the disabled and both buildings are adapted for wheelchair access. A designated disabled toilet and shower room is in place within both schools.

The school operates a policy of early intervention as it is crucial that pupils who have Additional Needs are identified quickly. Outside agencies may become involved when external support is required.

Children who do not require outside agency assistance but who need support have such needs met by the school either through Universal Provision or Universal Targeted Provision. This is discussed by the ALNCo, Teacher, Parent and Child. Support is provided either in small groups or individually, usually within the class setting. Intervention strategies are delivered by highly skilled Teaching Assistants

There is excellent communication with Ysgol Bryn Hyfryd. The year 7 Co-ordinator visits school to discuss the needs of pupils and those with Additional Needs are highlighted for any necessary action. If a pupil is transferring to another school, the same efforts are made to ensure a smooth change over for the pupil and continuity of provision. The Additional Leaning Needs Co-ordinator attended meetings held by Denbighshire County Council to be kept up-to-date of recent changes within the Inclusion Service. The co-ordinator works alongside the class teachers and external agencies where necessary.

PUPILS WITH DISABILITIES

We have an Equal Opportunities Policy and any new pupils with disabilities are treated the same as able bodied pupils. The school is fully compliant with Disabled access. Ysgol Bro Famau is a fully inclusive school.

Suitable provision is made for all pupils. We do not discriminate on the basis of colour, language, disability or ethnic or social background. All pupils whatever their ability, are given the same opportunity to develop their full potential. A current accessibility plan exists at school. The buildings are accessible to wheelchairs.

THE USE OF WELSH IN SCHOOL.

Ysgol Bro Famau is an English medium primary school. However, we are aware of the fact that being in Wales that we have to comply with the Welsh Assembly's guidance that

all schools throughout Wales need to provide Welsh as an additional language and that their aim is to have a bilingual Wales.

The teaching of Welsh as a second language is a statutory requirement and has dedicated time in the school's timetable. Also, extensive involvement is encouraged in activities that not only build on language skills but also develops the Welsh ethos. Children in Foundation Phase receive one hour of Welsh lessons a week and Key Stage 2 receive one and a half hours of Welsh a week. However, Welsh is used incidentally throughout the day by staff and children. Many of our teachers and Classroom Assistants are proficient Welsh speakers.

The use of Welsh as an incidental (every day) language in class through various activities helps the children to become more aware and develop their understanding of the language and build confidence in their use of it. As a result, the school is developing a strong Welsh ethos that fosters pride among the staff and pupils in their locality, community, nation and culture as well as our dual languages.

The school takes part in a number of activities that promote our bilingual ethos and also meet the Welsh Assembly directive to create bilingual children, demonstrating confidence in both languages.

During the year we have a number of 'special days' that promote the Welsh language and our Welsh heritage. Pupils take part in the School Eisteddfod and a few go on to participate in the local and county Urdd Eisteddfod.

During the autumn term, Reception, Years 1 and 2 participated in the annual Welsh jamboree, singing Welsh action songs and being entertained by Welsh presenter Martyn Geraint.

TOILET FACILITIES

The boys' and girls' toilets are of a satisfactory standard. All toilets are cleaned and inspected daily.

<u>SAFETY</u>

An effective safety system is in place whilst pupils and staff are in school. The safety system is reviewed regularly. A fire drill is held every term. All portable electrical appliances were inspected during the year. A full Health and Safety audit was carried out and recommendations implemented. It is ensured that the adult to pupil ratio is correct when pupils go on any excursion. The school has a number of first aiders and the correct procedures are followed whenever first aid is administered.
